# INTERNATIONAL PUMA DAY





The species is known as puma, cougar and mountain lion.



It occurs from Canada to Chile, including the entire Brazilian territory.



It is the second largest feline in the Americas and can occupy different types of environments throughout the continent, such as deserts, tropical forests and temperate forests.



Cubs are born with spots all over their bodies, a pattern that disappears during their growth, giving way to a more uniform color.

In August it's celebrated the International Puma Day, also known as cougar (Puma concolor), an important day to share information and curiosities about this species!

Our work in the rewild branch has its focus on, besides jaguars and maned wolves, the pumas!

Currently, the pumas Chico and Nala are going through the rehabilitation process with our team in Reserva Santa Sofia, Pantanal and, in July this year, after almost two years of work, the male Oliver returned to wildlife in Caiman Pantanal!

# STRAIGHT FROM THE FIELD: PARQUE NACIONAL DO ITATIAIA



We carried out the first monitoring campaign in Parque Nacional do Itatiaia (PNI), our new base in the Atlantic Forest. The monitoring has 15 camera traps distributed in high ground, with a vegetation formation of fields, and in the low ground, where forests predominate

We registered 26 mammal species, among them ocelot, lesser anteater, collared peccary, robust capuchin monkey and puma.
